Dear Sister Wells:

Among the good and true that have been gathered to the silent Tomb in this locality the past few months, none has received greater expressions of gratitude and affection than Sister Nancy E. Hall who departed this life, after much suffering and lingering sickness.

Sister Hall was born near Jamestown, Russell County, Kentucky, Feb. 23, 1826, was married to Edward Hall Feb. 2, 1842, was baptized at Fort Kearney July 5, 1850 by Bp. David Evans, arriving at Springville March 10, 1851 where she resided until her death, which occurred Jan 24, 1890. Kindness and sympathy towards suffering humanity has been among the most prominent features of her life. In the cabin of the poor or in the circles of the wealthy, no discrimination was shown, sunshine or storm, day or night, Sr. Hall was ever on hand to act the part of the "good Samaritan" ministering to the afflicted and comforting the sorrowing, assisted at the birth of over 600 children and clothed over 300 for the Tomb. She was the mother of eleven children, grandmother to 56 and great-grandmother to 17.

As a member of the Relief Society, Sr. Hall filled a very important position seeking for her services neither fee or reward in this life. She has gone with a record full of merit to her memory that will credit her a full reward, and ample compensation of an eternal character for a life time of usefulness and benefits bestowed by her generous hands upon the suffering sons and daughters of humanity.
